- I. President Munroe called the meeting to order at 2:06 pm.
- II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES:
 - A. The November 25th, 2020 College Council Meeting and organizational minutes were unanimously approved.
- III. STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS/UPDATES

A. Budget Committee

Report is provided below.

Questions/Comments

- President Munroe stated that the college is facing a projected budget deficit of about thirty million dollars. AVP Samuels confirmed that this is the worst case scenario and hopefully our situation will improve.
- b. TAP financial aid receipts in FY 20-21 are still 20% down.
- c. Of the forty-two million awarded to BMCC based on CRRSSA act how much CUNY is going to allocate BMCC? Not clear, CUNY is awaiting for DOE clarification on what the money can be used for.

- d. Perkins money has not been distributed. The College has been fronting the money in hope that the State will release the funds.
 The BMCC proposal was just approved with months delay; funds are expected within a month.
- Almost eight thousand students have outstanding tuition balances for fall semester and many more owe from previous semesters.
 BMCC will be able to use at least \$13.2 million dollars from the institutional portion of CRRSSA funds for emergency grants to students. This money can be applied toward accounts receivable with the written student's permission. The CRRSSA funds cannot be used for any outstanding balances incurred prior to December 27th.

B. Technology Committee

IT strategic planning is under discussion.

C. Facilities and Security Committee

Ongoing COVID operation protocols and capital projects are under discussion. CUNY in the Heights with predicted completion is Fall 2021.

D. The Campus life and Student Issues Committee

The plan on informing students about all the non-academic resources available through the advisement process is under way.

A student panel commented on the experience of distance learning. Students appreciate the instruction they are receiving and appeal to understanding of their situations. They request multiple and flexible ways to receive information.

IV. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

We continue to reflect and support an inclusive and respectful student focused environment. President Munroe thanks the Faculty and Staff and states this is possibly why BMCC was chosen by Ms Scott for her very generous thirty million dollars gift. The money is in a holding account and the investment of the money that will be part of the President's Fund for Excellence and Innovation is being planned. More details in the attached President's Report.

Questions/ Comments

- a. Is "good-standing" a condition to receive tuition assistance? Could unrestricted funds be used to assist students to bring them to good standing? BMCC Strives the help as many students as possible the process in under discussion.
- b. The thirty-million gift will be invested to last for years to come, the money will not be used to pay student debt.

VI. NEW BUSINESS

- a. February the 3th is the opening of Black History Month at BMCC, the community is encouraged to see what is planned on the website.

FY 20-21 PTOJECTED TAX- LEVY RESOURCES

- BMCC continues to operate on the 7-months budget allocation that reflects 20% reduction in the base allocation.
- Tuition revenue is projected to miss the revenue target by \$14M-\$16M depending on the final Spring 21 enrollment.
- Revenue target is not realistic, as it is over \$2M higher than actual tuition collected in FY19-20.
- More than a half of the Reserve was already applied to cover the prior FY revenue shortfall.
- Total tax-levy resources are projected to be \$46M or 24% lower than in the prior FY.

FY 20-21 TAX-LEVY EXPENDITURES

- Tax-levy expenditures are projected to be reduced by \$11M or 6% compared to the prior FY.
- Full-time employees cost is projected to be lower by 2% than in FY19-20, mainly as a result of reduced overtime costs and the hiring freeze.
- Adjuncts cost is projected to be reduced by 9%, which is still very preliminary pending the final Spring 21 enrollment.
- Temporary services cost is being reduced by about 28% mainly due to reduction of college assistants hours.
- OTPS expenses are expected to be lower by approximately \$11M or 6%.
- As a result, a budget deficit of \$30M is projected for FY20-21.

CARES ACT HEERF STIMULUS PACKAGE

- As a result of CARES Act, BMCC was allocated the following Higher Education Emergency Relief Funds (HEERF):
- Emergency Financial Aid \$13,210,414
- Institutional Portion \$13,210,414
- Minority Serving Institutions (MIS) \$1,720,729
- Total: \$28,141,557
- Emergency Financial Aid funds have been distributed to Pell eligible students centrally. \$940K was left for distribution at the college's discretion.
- Less than \$2M of the Institutional portion of funds was claimed for reimbursement of eligible expenses and the balance remains unspent.
- The college was not given access to MIS funds, which are less restrictive and can be used to offset the revenue losses.

CORONAVIRUS RESPONSE AND RELIEF SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS ACTS

- The new stimulus package approved on 12/27/20 called the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Acts (CRRSSA - phonetically – CRIS-A); these are considered supplemental grant funds.
- BMCC was allocated the following:

•	CARES ACT Minimum Amount for Emergency Grants to Students	\$13,210,414
•	Maximum Amount for Institutional Portion	\$42,008,078
•	Total:	\$55,218,492

Amount allocated to Minority Serving Institutions have not been announced.

STUDENT AID PORTION (EMERGENCY GRANTS TO STUDENTS)

- College will be required to disburse emergency grants to students for the same amount as the CARES Act HEERF.
- College must prioritize students with exceptional needs, such as students who received Pell Grants, in awarding financial aid grants to students. However, unlike CARES, students do not need to be only Pell recipients or students that are eligible for Pell. We are required to 'carefully document' how students with 'exceptional need' will be prioritized.
- Grants can be used to satisfy a student's outstanding account balance with the student's written (or electronic) 'affirmative consent'. However, the consent cannot be a condition of receipt of or eligibility for the financial aid grant.

ENHANCED FLEXIBILITY FOR INSTITUTIONAL PORTION OF CRRSSA FUNDS

- Defraying expenses associate with coronavirus (including <u>lost revenue</u>, reimbursement for expenses already incurred, technology costs associated with a transition to distance education, faculty and staff trainings, and payroll).
- Carrying out student support activities authorized by the Higher Education Act of 1965, like GEAR UP, that addresses needs related to coronavirus.
- Making additional financial aid grants to students.
- Institutions have the expanded flexibility to use unliquidated (unspent) CARES funds effective December 27, 2020.

- We celebrate, congratulate and welcome Joe Biden as the 46th President of the United States of America and Kamala Harris, who is the first woman, first black and first Asian-American to serve as our country's Vice President.
- I encourage all of us at BMCC to reflect on the challenges we have faced these past months – the pandemic, racial injustices, and the unsettling political divide that fueled hatred and the insurrection at the U.S. Capitol – and focus on healing and unification to carry us forward into the Spring 2021 semester and beyond.
- Perhaps the most important contribution each of us can make during these highly emotional times is to create a learning environment that is fully inclusive, respectful of all points of view, and most importantly safe and comfortable for all students and every member of the BMCC Community.

Transformational Gift; Establishment of the President's Fund for Excellence and Innovation

- \$30 million unrestricted gift from philanthropist and author MacKenzie Scott. I know you join me in thanking Ms. Scott, for this extraordinary gift.
- A vast majority of funds from this one-time gift will be invested in order to generate an on-going annual income that will be used to support important and forward-thinking initiatives. In this way, we will benefit both our current and future students and College.
- The President's Fund for Excellence and Innovation has been established. This fund will boost BMCC's efforts to improve student learning and success, enhance research and knowledge creation, and advance socioeconomic mobility through the transformative power of education. It will support and allow for strategic investment in innovative projects, initiatives, and programming that advance the College's mission, move BMCC towards realization of the vision, and honor Ms. Scott's desire to focus on basic needs, equity and inclusion, economic mobility, and support the communities that are disproportionately disadvantaged.

Transformational Gift; Establishment of the President's Fund for Excellence and Innovation


- Consistent with the donor's intent, we are developing a process by which proposed projects can be formally submitted to a committee that will review all proposals and make recommendations to the President, who will make the final decision on projects that will be funded. This committee will be comprised of members of the BMCC community, including faculty, staff, students, and representatives from governance.

- BMCC continues to follow CDC and New York State Department of Health guidelines in repopulating campus buildings. To protect the health of the college community, the majority of BMCC classes are being delivered from a distance for the Spring 2021 semester.
- BMCC is operating at 25% capacity in the 199 Chambers Street Building and Murray Street Building. Fiterman Hall is now active.
- The BMCC campus is reprogramming in phases approved by CUNY and the State of New York. This plan is guided by reduced capacity (number of people on campus) in each phase and careful monitoring before increasing that capacity for the next phase.




BMCC Spring 2021 (I-A) Physical Distancing – Limit Occupancy and Congestion (Not to Exceed 25%)



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
BMCC Spring 2021 (I-A) Physical Distancing – Limit Occupancy and Congestion (Building Program)



Strategic Plan 2020-2025

- The input from more than 1,000 members of the BMCC community in the Designing for Success initiative is foundational to our efforts to redesign for student learning and success – I want to thank all those involved in this important work.
- Strategic Planning Continued their Work in spring and summer 2020 this work was honored.
- Designing for Success work did culminate in the fall with the reconvening of the group and a review of information on impacts of the pandemic.



Enrollment Management

- Enrollment is following nationwide, statewide and systemwide trend and double-digit declines are expected.
- Student financial holds were lifted for students with balances less than \$2600 and in good standing.
- Spring 2 registration will begin on February 4th. Term begins on March 19th and runs through May 20th. 34 sections (~ 850 heads) will be offered
- Rapid Response Enrollment Management Task Force is wrapping up
- Formal Strategic Enrollment Management Committee will launch in February/March.

News and Developments

- The BMCC Nursing Program recognized 143 graduates from the classes of June 2020 and January 2021 during a virtual pinning ceremony January 6. The most recent BMCC graduates will take the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (RNs). Congratulations!
- BMCC has been selected as one of 17 colleges and universities nationwide to be part of the NBCU Academy, just launched by NBCUniversal News Group. The NBCU Academy is a multi-platform journalism training and development program providing on-campus training and online programming. The initiative also provides a curriculum for hands-on learning with world-class NBCU News Group journalists, as well as funding for accredited journalism programs and scholarships.
- The Office of Academic Affairs is hosting "Recharge, Reconnect, Restart," two halfday virtual events to kick off the new semester on January 26. I hope faculty and staff are taking advantage of the activities focused on trauma-informed and anti-racist pedagogy.
