top priority at BMCC, and one of our 2020–2025 Strategic Goals, is to integrate career development throughout the student experience. What this looks like, across disciplines and many programs, is illustrated throughout this issue of the "BMCC Commons."

One example is our partnership with the Aspen Transfer Scholars Network (TSN), a national collective of colleges and universities led by the Aspen Institute College Excellence Program with support from the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation. The TSN facilitates the transfer of community college graduates into bachelor's degree programs at Ivy League and other elite institutions.

Another example of BMCC's response to student ambitions and industry trends is reflected in the Mathematics Department's new Associate of Science in Data Science degree program. Data Science graduates will wield much-needed programming and analytic skills as they fill a workforce gap created by the dramatic growth of data used in science, business, government and other fields.

In the Teacher Education Department, career awareness informed the curricular inclusion of Computational Thinking, which provides BMCC graduates with a competitive edge as they apply for teaching fellowships, graduate programs and employment opportunities.

Across campus, in the Music and Art Department, support for students' career goals takes many forms. Here's one. Three members of the BMCC student Guitar Ensemble, along with three members of the student Jazz Ensemble joined their professors at the WBGO recording studio in Newark, New Jersey to perform in an annual college focus—and gained an insider's look at the music industry.

One last example of career path building—among many—is found in the BMCC Center for Continuing Education and Workforce Development, where students complete training that prepares them to attain high-demand CISCO CCNA and Amazon Web Services Cloud Practitioner certifications first steps for aspiring professionals in the field, and among the 10 highest-paying IT certifications for 2023.

Education has the power to lift families and entire communities out of poverty. The essential bridges we build to advanced degrees create entry to careers in STEM and other growing fields. As our graduates achieve next steps in their higher education and career paths, they raise the quality of research, products and services in every industry they join. Our alumni enter their respective fields equipped with confidence, knowledge and the right skills to make their mark.

# From Theatre to Engineering, Alumni Make Their Mark

t Borough of Manhattan Community College (BMCC/CUNY), academic and career services are woven together, providing a unique learning experience for students. For some, deciding on a major can be a difficult choice. The college's Academic & Career Communities website is the perfect starting point for students who want to explore the different career paths available to them and hone in on their academic pursuits.

BMCC also offers an abundance of workforce initiatives and internships, as well as career counseling and other services. Whether majoring in Engineering, Theatre or one of the other 50-plus associate degree programs offered at BMCC—and whether a student is at the admissions, course engagement or graduation phase of their time at the College—career options are always part of the conversation.

Opportunities for career entry also arise informally, such as when faculty share their industry networks with students, and validate their passion for a given field.

"Most BMCC students do not have family members or connections in the theatre industry," says Theatre Professor **Katherine Kavanagh**. "Since many of us in the Theatre program actively work in the field, we can help fill that role."

Through Professor Kavanagh's support and that of other faculty, three alumni of the Theatre program in the Department of Speech, Communications and Theatre Arts have made solid

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entries into the profession of theatre management.

Sebastian Jean Louis (Theatre, '21) is a Production Stage Manager at the immersive-theatre-focused McKittrick Hotel. Mariko Takizawa (Theatre, '17) is a General Manager with Emursive Productions and a freelance stage manager through the Actors' Equity Association (AEA). Kenny Nuñez (Theatre, '13), is a Broadway Theatre Manager at the Shubert Theatre. All three alumni credit the leads on job openings, moral support and the professional example provided by their professors at BMCC, as helping to kick off their careers.

Faculty also support students' continued higher education and advanced degrees, by their own example.

#### Kicking off a career in chemical engineering

ne faculty member who impacted me was Brahmadeo Dewprashad," says 2009 Engineering alumnus Francois Payen. "He went to MIT for a Ph.D. in organic chemistry which opened my eyes to the directions you can go with advanced degrees in chemistry. I joined several research projects led by Professor Dewprashad. We looked at the chemical properties of indigenous plants of the Caribbean, their pharmacological applications, and how they can be used in alternative medicine."

While earning an associate degree in chemical engineering at BMCC, Mr. Payen, a Phi Theta Kappa Honor student, earned the Abner B. Rosenfield Scholarship, the Black Male Initiative Award, the Salzburg Seminar award and others. He also participated in Study Abroad trips to France, Austria and Spain. His next step was to earn a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering at the New York University School of Engineering. "When I entered NYU, it gave me an advantage, having had lab experience at BMCC," he says. "Once I got my bachelor's degree, I went to the University of Wisconsin-Madison for a master's in Materials Science and Engineering."

Mr. Payen now works as a site Capital Portfolio and Engineering Manager, overseeing multi-million-dollar projects at Livent Corporation, which according to its website, harnesses lithium technology to power a cleaner, healthier and more sustainable world.

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Mr. Payen manages over 100 capital projects for operations, and research and development, among other responsibilities. He works from Livent's North Carolina manufacturing site in the greater Charlotte area, where he lives with his wife and three daughters.

The international aspects of the lithium industry are a good fit for Mr. Payen, who grew up in Haiti and moved to New York City after he graduated from high school. "My sister came to New York before me," he says. "She started at Queensborough Community College, then went to Queens College for her bachelor's degree, and obtained a Ph.D. in Neuroscience from Boston University. I wanted to be in Manhattan, and I learned that BMCC had science programs linked to bachelor's degree programs in Ivy Leagues and CUNY schools I was interested in. I spoke French and Haitian Creole back then, so first, I had to take some time to focus on my English."

Today, Mr. Payen says, he is fluent in four languages: Spanish, French, Haitian Creole and English. He has worked at Livent for five years, having worked previously as a senior engineer at Collins Aerospace and Alcoa Inc. and having started as a research scientist at the Wisconsin Institute for Discovery. In the summer of 2023, his current employer, Livent, sent Mr. Payen to The Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania's prestigious General Management Program. "That experience has been tremendously useful as I prepare for the next steps of my career," he says.

Mr. Payen also serves as president of the non-profit Association Haitienne de Developpement Humain (AHDH). He leads a team of about 50 medical doctors, nurses and engineers, and heads up innovative programs promoting healthcare, education and cultural enlightenment with the goal of empowering Haitians to be self-sufficient and achieve their goals. Mr. Payen is also a board member of Dogwood Classical Academy, a nonprofit, tuition-free public charter school in the Charlotte, North Carolina area.

"Francois has come a long way, but I'm not surprised," says Professor Dewprashad. "We've stayed in touch, and I see in him today what I saw back then when he was my student—the curiosity and personal interest but also an impressive aptitude for the technology of engineering science, ethical aspects and understanding the wide range of STEM applications and how they can improve our quality of life worldwide."

#### Faculty share a love of theatre, and guide students to job leads in the industry

y students and I share a love of theatre, and in my class 'Theatre Management: Exploring Theatres of New York City and Beyond,' we attend performances together thanks to my partners on and off Broadway, especially at Manhattan Theatre Club, Second Stage Theatre and SoHo Rep," says Professor Kavanagh.

The theatre management class provides a deeper understanding of roles that fall under the wide umbrella of theatre management, she explains. In one assignment, students interview people working in several theatre company departments such as marketing, fundraising and company management.

"On any given production, dozens of people are behind the scenes working collectively to create a successful show and a healthy environment for everyone on stage and off, including the audience," she says. "I often connect students with professional contacts to help them build a professional network." Sebastien Jean Louis graduated from BMCC in 2021 with an Associate in Science (A.S.) degree in Theatre and now works as a Production Stage Manager at McKittrick Hotel, a pre-World War II structure reinvented as an immersive theatre setting.

"I started as an intern and was promoted several times," says Mr. Louis. "Now I'm completing my Bachelor of Arts in Theatre at Brooklyn College, CUNY, with plans to graduate this December 2023."

That initial internship happened because of an email from Professor Kavanagh to her students, alerting them to a justannounced wave of open apprenticeships in New York City theatres.

"The faculty and staff in the Theatre Program all care a lot about theatre and what they do at BMCC," says Mr. Louis. "They offer assistance and support long after graduation, which helps make BMCC a fantastic place to prepare for a career in theatre. I was always determined to work in the entertainment industry in some way or form. When I saw the email from Professor Kavanagh, I felt it was a wonderful way to get a foot in the door. So, I took the chance and here we are!"

BMCC alumna Mariko Takizawa (Theatre, '17) worked in the fashion industry in Japan, before moving to New York City and switching her focus to a career in theatre. She now works as General Manager, a permanent,

senior staff position with Emursive Productions, as well as holding the position of a freelance stage manager, a union position through the Actors' Equity Association (AEA).

Ms. Takizawa says she has loved theatre since she was a child. "I started playing the trumpet at the age of nine and learned a lot of music from musicals and operas," she says. "So, it was very natural for me to be attracted to theatre."

At BMCC, she says, "All the Theatre professors including Professor Kavanagh, were very supportive. They gave me a lot of chances, advice and knowledge, and some professors helped me to find internships in the industry. I learned stage management from faculty who were and still are working on Broadway, in addition to their roles at BMCC, and now I am working in the same industry and in the same union that I dreamed of. I am still talking to some of my professors although I graduated in 2017, and asking for advice as my career grows."

Those opportunities, she says, helped her to develop an industry network and find a job after graduation—which also enabled her to apply for a Temporary Worker Visa. "I should add that the staff in the International Students Office at BMCC were very supportive, as well," she says.

Kenny Nuñez, who grew up in the Washington Heights neighborhood of Upper Manhattan, earned his Associate of Science (A.S.) in Theatre in 2013 and then a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) in Theatre from Lehman College, CUNY in 2020. Today, he works as a Broadway Theatre Manager at the Shubert Theatre—"a permanent, unionized position," he adds with pride.

"Ever since I was young, theatre has been my escape," he says. "It always brought me joy. I wanted to learn more and share my craft with the world. The professors at BMCC pushed us and challenged us to be better artists. They connected us with Theatre companies and artists who helped shape my career."


He landed his first job in theatre through a friend working as an usher Off-Broadway. "He introduced me to the manager," Mr. Nuñez says. "I made connections with a company manager who introduced me to The Shubert Organization. I joined their two-year apprenticeship program, but a year into the program, I was promoted to Theatre

Manager." He says he has always wanted to work in entertainment. "Becoming a Theatre Manager took a lot of hard work and dedication. I never thought that I would be doing what I am doing. I am an Afro-Latino managing the Shubert Organization's flagship theatre. How awesome is that! Anything is possible!"

Regarding the varied paths her former students have taken, Professor Kavanagh says, "There is not a singular blueprint for creating a successful career in the theatre," adding that some students continue their education with bachelor's degree programs, others go right to work.

"Whatever the student's goal, we prepare them to apply for opportunities that put them at the center of the industry," she says. "It has always been my goal to create a network of current BMCC Theatre majors and alumni to support each other. In such a competitive field, it's important to lift one another up."

# Looking Back, as BMCC Celebrates Its 60-Year Anniversary

Professor Sandra Poster Founds the Sandra Sollod Poster Scholarship for Communication Studies Majors and Looks Back on 50 Years at BMCC.

Reference and the college, Professor Sandra Poster's tenure at BMCC was from 1967 to 2017. Over time she taught classes including Speech 100, Interpersonal Communication and Mass Media. Professor Poster also served in the Office of Academic Affairs as Assistant to the Dean, Assistant Dean and Associate Dean. Her accomplishments including having created two academic degree programs, having chaired the gala community and helped organize commencements in many venues. Most of all, in her 50 years at the college, Professor Poster was witness to BMCC's meteoric rise as an institution, from its inception in 1963.

"In 1967, BMCC was housed in rented office space in the mid-fifties off Seventh Avenue," she says. "This was in the Times Square area before it got 'cleaned up,' and most of us knew the names of individuals frequenting particular street corners as we went to teach our classes in the Tango Palace Dance Hall. As the college grew, we needed more facilities and offered classes in the Knights of Pythias building in the Lincoln Center area."

Abraham Beame was the mayor of New York City at that time. "There are photographs of the Chambers Street campus groundbreaking in the midseventies," says Professor Poster. "They had broken ground for 199 about five years before we moved there, then the City ran out of money. Steelwork had been put up and it just sat there on the side of the West Side Highway for years, rusting in the salt air."

As Professor Poster recalls, "The 'new campus' was mostly finished by the 1982–83 winter break, and we packed the whole college in boxes, moved to 199 Chambers Street and opened for classes that spring of 1983."

"We felt like we had died and gone to heaven," she says of the move. "When were in the rented office space, we barely had a library, we had no cafeteria, and we had no conference rooms or theatre space—it was just classrooms and offices. When we moved to 199, suddenly we had all these magnificent facilities."

In those early years, she says, "There was no such thing as Tribeca, or Battery Park City. We had an unobstructed view of the Statue of Liberty. It was mostly just dirt and sand. You sort of crunched your way up Chambers Street. The wholesale food district was still there—this was before it moved to Hunts Point. Today, if you look at the sides of buildings you still see references to butter and eggs."

The college grew dramatically from that point forward. "The Chambers Street campus had about 9,000 students and within about a year that number jumped to 14,000 maybe 17,000," she says. "There was one restaurant for the whole area. When we first moved in, there was no telephone service in the building. We used to kid that we should wear roller skates to get to our classes and go to meetings."

As the campus grew physically, BMCC's offerings of academic programs expanded. "When we moved to 199, **Joshua Smith** was president," says Professor Poster. "One day he called me into his office, unrolled some blueprints and pointed to something. 'It's a television studio,' he said. 'What are we going to do with it?' I looked at him and just like that I said, 'We're going to start a degree program for students'— and that's what we did."

Professor Poster explains that at that time, "cable television was first getting started and corporations were building television studios in their own facilities. Most of our students didn't have connections and parents who could open corporate doors for them, but once they had a two-year degree, we could help them move right into jobs."

She says the competition to get into the big three networks was intense. "You had to know somebody, but our graduates could get jobs in corporate media centers and in the fledgling cable industry, so we called the program, 'Corporate and Cable Communications,' or 'CCC.' Then we changed it to 'Media Arts,' and today of course it's a whole department, 'Media Arts and Technology,' with programs including Animation and Motion Graphics, Multimedia Programming and Design, and Video Arts and Technology."

Also around that time, Professor Poster led BMCC's participation in an early form of distance learning.

"In the 1980s, I heard about a new technology that used interactive television

to connect various educational sites in New York," she says. "This was long before Zoom. I jumped on this and BMCC became the first college in New York City to be part of an interactive distance learning network. We taught Critical Thinking classes via the distance network to students

at three area high schools, along with our BMCC students."

Later, Professor Poster was instrumental in creating the college's first Communication Studies program, which started in 2012 and is housed in the Speech, Communications and Theatre Arts department.

"We used to tell our students, it prepares you for everything, and it prepares you for nothing. You don't see wants ads saying, 'Communicator Wanted.' But with more and more companies and organizations looking for communication experts, our students are finding this a very popular and very flexible major."

In addition to her academic leadership, Professor Poster says she was also responsible for commencement at BMCC for 14 years.

"Our first commencement was in the ballroom at the Americana Hotel

on Seventh Avenue. As the college expanded, we moved commencement to Riverside Church—then Carnegie Hall, Avery Fisher Hall and the Theater at Madison Square Garden. We kept outgrowing our spaces and eventually went to the Javits Center."

She gives the origin of a BMCC commencement tradition: faculty seated on stage. "One year, they gave out 600 more tickets than we had seats. We only found this out the night before commencement and before they could shut us down for violation of the fire code, we came up with the solution of putting the faculty on the stage, freeing up seats in the house. The faculty has been there ever since."

Another highlight for Professor Poster

was chairing the BMCC fundraising gala. "We held it on campus at first," she says. "We wanted donors to come to our new facilities, so we had the event in the main lobby at Chambers Street. We had twinkling lights in boxed trees, a bar and elegant tables that seated twelve each. We

put the dance band on the little balcony over the front lobby, and we would have hundreds of guests. Most of our donors had never been to the college, so Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society students with BMCC jackets greeted people at the base of the ramp at 199 and would walk them up the ramp with umbrellas if it was raining. We wanted people to know who we were and where we were."

A relentless fundraiser, Sandra says she was "shameless" about going after support for the college. "I wanted our students to have the best." Ultimately, she says, she was responsible for over \$14 million in grants and donations.

Recently, Professor Poster funded the Sandra Sollod Poster Scholarship for Communication Studies majors. "I keep in touch with quite a few former students," says Professor Poster of the students she worked closely with for over 50 years at BMCC. "These young people are spectacular."
