President's Report College Council December 4, 2024

PMP DEEP DIVE

College was congratulated on:

- Enrollment growth: highest in CUNY
- Express semester model: increased enrollment
- Compliance rates for most mandatory professional development trainings
- Improvement in collection rates: helped reduce deficit
- 32% reduction in structural deficit
- Increase in college's reserves

HIGHLIGHTED DEEP DIVE SUGGESTED ACTIONS

- The Chancellor suggests that the College explore how to attract the large population of about 750,000 New Yorkers who have some college but not a completed degree.
- Credit loss for transfer students at BMCC is especially pronounced in healthcare programs such as Nursing and Health & Nutrition Sciences.
- BMCC is encouraged to investigate the following related to its academic programs: 30-credit majors which do not permit students to take any elective courses and could potentially be streamlined; low-enrolled or zero-enrolled programs that could potentially be reimagined or closed.
- BMCC needs a coordinated strategy for improving career outcomes.
- OAA suggests engaging faculty more directly in BMCC's work to leverage Credit for Prior Learning and recommends consultation with University Director of Credit for Prior Learning Alyssa Vine.
- OAA suggests considering reinvestment of funds currently slated for immersion programs into first-year experience programming and/or the corequisite model.
- BMCC is encouraged to increase utilization of CUNYBuy with a special focus on economy of scale and improving MWBE numbers.

In summary:

BMCC has made good progress with its structural deficit and must continue to be vigilant about reducing expenses while considering how to address critical personnel needs.

- Fall Enrollment Target FTE 14,675 Q1 Projection = 14,989*
- Spring to Fall Retention Target 59% Q1 Projection = 60%
- Spring Targets:
- Spring Enrollment Target FTE 13,737 Q1 Projection = 13,843
- Fall to Spring Retention Target 71%
- Fall to Fall (overall) Retention Target 63% (2% increase)

- BMCC joined 471 campuses in being named 2024 ALL IN's Most Engaged Campuses for College Student Voting for our intentional efforts to increase nonpartisan democratic engagement and college student voting
- Dr. Harry Mars have transitioned from his role at BMCC and is no longer with the institution
- Dean Hutmaker will be departing from BMCC in early January
- Dr. Celiany Rivera is the new manager of the Center for Belonging and Inclusion
- Darin Soliman is the new manager of the Health and Wellness Center

- Current total FY25 individual pledge and cash contributions total \$3,099,316
 - YTD new endowed and Major Donor pledges/gift commitments: \$376,850
 - Bequest pledge/gift commitments = \$350,000

Recent Grant Awards

- \$76,642 over 5 years to Professor Robin Isserles for the evaluation of the CCNY-MSK Partnership for Cancer Research, Education and Community Outreach, funded by the National Institutes of Health (NIH). Over the past 10 years, the CCNY-MSK Partnership has implemented trailblazing, community-engaged outreach and research, and addressed socioeconomic determinants of health and gaps in cancer outcomes and quality of care for medically underserved communities.
- \$60,000 over two years to support the Baruch Business Academy in deepening and integrating our collaboration with Baruch College's Zicklin School of Business. BMCC and Baruch were among only 16 of 47 institutions from across the country funded through the American Talent Initiative's IDEAS grant, funded by Bloomberg Philanthropies.
