COURSE REVISION - NURSING 415

I. COURSE DESCRIPTION: CURRENT AND PROPOSED

Current Course Description:

This course will include discussion of the legal rights and responsibilities of the professional nurse, current trends in employment and education, as well as changes in nursing practice.

Proposed Course Description:

With an emphasis on the process of transitioning from Student Nurse to Registered Professional Nurse, Professional Issues in Contemporary Nursing Practice surveys the issues, challenges and current trends faced by the new Associate Degree Nurse as an individual practitioner, and as a member of the nursing profession.

This course encourages students to think critically about the nursing profession and career opportunities, historical and theoretical nursing frameworks, the legal and ethical aspects of nursing, cultural and social issues, standards of nursing practice, delegation and supervision, communication and inter-professional collaboration, technology and social media in the clinical setting, evidence based practice and quality improvement.

II. REASON FOR CHANGE: DESCRIPTION AND CONTENT

The profession of Nursing is at a crucial time of transformation. To be effective, today's Graduate Nurse must not only possess the knowledge and skills to take care of patients but they must be leaders and team members, think critically and creatively, grapple with ethical and social policy dilemmas, utilize and manage new technologies and, meet the increasingly complex demands of the health care system. They are expected to keep pace with the rapidity of changes in the health care environment while managing their own professional development. To be successful, it is necessary for the Graduate Nurse to make the transition to independent practice smoothly and rapidly.

This course revision is two-fold: to expand the course content beyond the topics previously offered, and to provide the tools needed to face the challenges and issues of contemporary nursing practice in a safe setting.

This course is being revised to meet the current needs of the Graduate Nurse to better prepare her/him to successfully practice nursing in today's complex, technologically oriented, health care environment.

III. REASON FOR CHANGE: HYBRID

Because N415 is held once per week, 66% of the enrolled students are required to come to campus on a day/evening they would otherwise not be on campus - for one hour. Student feedback about the scheduling of N415 has been consistently negative for several semesters. Changing the format demonstrates administrative and faculty response to student feedback.

Changing the format of this course is also in keeping with BMCC Strategic Plan (Priority 1: Excellence in Teaching, Research and Learning / Objective 1.3: Expand the use of technology to facilitate student learning, improve student services and ensure technologically proficient students, faculty and staff). The Nursing Department currently offers one we-enhanced course (N211). In the Spring semester of 2015, the revised n415 will be one of two Nursing courses offered in a hybrid format.

Finally, the revised course content of N415 lends itself to hybrid format, as it incorporates engaging interactive and independent learning activities that are more participatory and learner centered. Shifting focus is important at this stage in the Nursing Program, as Graduate Nurses are expected to assume responsibility for their own professional development.
